

FRUIT PRODUCERS

Gala Apple- 18-20'x 12-15' The Gala Apple Tree is an easy to grow, adaptable tree that matures quickly. The apples are highly coveted for pies and sauces, and the tree itself would be an attractive addition to any yard. Yellow green apple with red stripes, extended ripening, and stores up to 6 months. Recommended pollinators: Fuji, Granny Smith, Honeycrisp, Red Delicious

Honeycrisp Apple- 12-15'x 12-15' A modern apple in high demand. Outstanding fresh-eating qualities make this variety an American favorite. Fruit is aromatic and sweet as honey with an explosively juicy, crisp texture. Grow this naturally compact tree even in small spaces. Cold-hardy tree with apples that ripen in early September. Pollinator required: Choose another early or mid-blooming apple variety like Jonathan, Golden Delicious, or Liberty.

Jonathan Apple- 12-15'x 12-15' A true American apple, the Jonathan was discovered near the beginning of the 19th century in Woodstock, NY. These medium-sized, round apples have such a compelling sweet-tart taste that they are now one of the most commercially-produced apples in the United States. Pollinator required: Choose another mid or late-blooming apple variety, like Granny Smith or any type of Gala or Golden Delicious.

Liberty Apple- 12-15'x 12-15' A prolific bearer that is low-maintenance due to its natural disease resistance to apple scab, cedar apple rust, fire blight, and powdery mildew. Fruit has a yellow background with attractive red overtones, a crisp white flesh, and a harmonious sweet-tart taste. Perfect for fresh eating, cooking, canning or keeping – proper storage improves the flavor! Cold-hardy. Ripens in September. Pollinator required: Granny smith, Jonathan, or Pink lady.

Mcintosh Apple- 12-15'x 12-15' Moderately large fruit with an appetizing apple aroma. Tree is a vigorous grower and a precocious bearer. Fruit is vibrant-red, thin, and peels easily and flesh is tender with a sprightly sweet-tart taste. Wonderful apple for fresh-eating, sauces, and cider. Good keeper in proper storage. Cold-hardy. Ripens in August. Best pollinators: Granny smith, Jonathan, or Pink lady.

Pink Lady Apple- 8-10'x 8-10' A divine dessert apple. This tree bears medium-size fruit with rich yellow skin blushed with pink. Apples have a unique flavor — the first bite is tart, followed by just the right amount of sweet. Also makes a great addition or stand-alone apple in pies! Ripens in late October. Best pollinators: Granny Smith, Fuji, or Red Delicious.

Red Fuji Apple- 12-16'x 12-16' Grow this grocery store favorite in your own backyard. These crisp, juicy and aromatic apples are quickly replacing Red Delicious in orchards. Fruit keeps up to 12 months when refrigerated. Ripens in late October. Best pollinators: Granny Smith, Gala, Honeycrisp, and Jonathan.

Lambert Cherry- 12-15'x 12-15' One of our most productive and reliable Cherry varieties, the Lambert Cherry Tree has been grown in the Pacific Northwest for over almost 150 years and is still in commercial production. Lambert Cherry features large, dark-red, richly flavorful, heart-shaped fruit which ripens in early to mid-July. Pollinator not required, but Royal Ann or Montmorency may improve fruiting.

Lapins Cherry- 15-18'x 15-18' Self-pollinating and tolerates late frost! One of the few self-pollinating sweet cherry trees. Puts on a brilliant spring show with billows of pink flowers. Deep, dark fruit has a Bing-like shape has a purple-red flesh that is sweet, firm and almost meaty. Exquisite fresh eating, right off the tree. Good overall disease-resistance and crack-resistance. Ripens in July.

Meteor Cherry- 10-14'x 8-12' Meteor Cherry Tree is genetically dwarf and only grows to about 10 feet in height. Meteor Cherry fruit is large, bright red with a clear yellowish fresh. It is a tart cherry and mainly used as a pie cherry. Great fruit trees for the home garden, Pie Cherries are smaller trees than sweet cherries. They are covered with abundant flowers in late spring and produce heavy crops of tart and flavorful fruit, great for baking and making juice. No pollinator required.

Royal Ann Cherry- 12-15'x 12-15' The Royal Ann Cherry Tree or Napoleon Cherry tree is an upright growing tree having very large fruit. The Royal Ann Cherry Tree is an all around cherry with a sweet flavor and skin color that is light yellow with a pinkish blush. Montmorency is the best pollinator.

North Star Cherry- 12-15'x 12-15' A heavy producer. The number of deliciously tart cherries from one of these trees will amaze you. The fruit is perfect for juice or any number of dessert recipes. The sturdy, vase-shaped tree is a beauty in the landscape. Bears just a few years after planting. Disease-resistant to brown rot and leaf spot. Cold-hardy. Ripens in June. Self-pollinating.

Contender Peach- 12-15'x 12-15' Grow peaches in regions where temperatures fall well below zero. This exceptionally hardy variety, perfect for northern gardens, consistently yields large crops of sweet, juicy, medium-to-large fruit. Also features lovely pink flowers that bloom and attract bees in spring. Disease-resistant to bacterial spot. Cold-hardy. Freestone. Ripens in August. Self-pollinating.

Elberta Peach- 12-15'x 12-15' A famed peach for canning. Tree bears crops of large, attractive yellow fruit with a splash of crimson. Juicy, evenly yellow flesh is great for fresh-eating as well as freezing and canning for extended enjoyment. Freestone. Ripens in September. Self-pollinating.

D'anjou Pear- 12-15'x 9-11' Still tasty seven months later. This pear hits all the right notes. It's cold-hardy, vigorous and precocious... and its keeping quality is unparalleled at up to seven months. Bright green and very firm at harvest, with a tinge of yellow as it ripens. Subtly sweet, fine-textured flesh. Harvest in late September. Best pollinator: Bartlett.

Summer Crisp Pear- 18-25'x 10-15' The summercrisp pear is a type of hardy pear tree that produces greenish fruit with a red "blush" to it that eventually features a yellowish color. Leaves are dark green, glossy and oval-shaped, and create a bushy-looking pear tree. Branches are vertical and generally do not require pruning, while flowers are pink and white in color. A healthy summercrisp pear showcases very little of the trunk; rather, the bushy branches dominate the majority of the tree. Pollinators: Bartlett or Kieffer.

Burbank Plum- 8-10'x 10' This winning Japanese-type plum almost has the color of a nectarine, with red blushing over a yellow background, with golden-orange flesh that is sweet and quite juicy. Dramatic spring blooms are pristine white against dark green foliage. A hardy tree that is easy to grow and

produces a large crop for fresh eating, fruit tarts, jams and jellies. Ripens in mid-July. Best pollinator: Santa Rosa, Abundance, or Red Heart.

Bartlett Pear- 18-20'x 12-13' The #1 pear worldwide! First introduced in 1797, this multi-purpose pear is a long-standing favorite of orchard growers and fruit gardeners alike. Starts bearing at a young age and is very productive. Fruit features a smooth, firm texture and a juicy, spicy taste. Harvest in late August. Best pollinators: Partially self-pollinating but D'Anjou or Kieffer will improve fruit set.

Baby Cakes Blackberry- 3-4'x 3-4' Baby Cakes™ is an exciting, new, thornless dwarf blackberry that presents a fireworks-like display of large, juicy berries in the summer! Its compact habit makes it perfect for patio pots. In most regions, this blackberry will produce twice in one season. Produces on second-year canes. Deciduous. Full Sun.

Blue Crop Blueberry- 4-6'x 3-4' A great blueberry plant for colder climates. Produces big clusters of large, all-purpose berries — perfect in salads or pies, or served with cream. Cold-hardy. Ripens in July. Self-pollinating, but will yield larger crops if pollinated with Jersey or Earliblue.

Elliot Blueberry- 4-6'x 4-5' Big and flavorful. This late-season variety will give you ½" berries that are firm, easy-to-pick and perfect for fresh eating or cooking. Lovely pink-tinged flowers will grace your landscape each spring. Provides seasonal interest with its attractive bright burgundy stems. Blooms late to avoid late spring frosts. Cold-hardy. Ripens in August. Self-pollinating.

Fall Gold Raspberry- 4-5'x 1 ½-2' One of the best and sweetest Raspberries available. This outstanding, everbearing variety features very sweet and flavorful, large, golden-yellow berries, great for fresh eating, preserves and freezing. Fall Gold can be mowed after harvest in the fall and will bear good crops the following summer without staking. Fall Gold will continue to produce fruits well into the fall season. Easy to grow and easy to pick with very smooth fruiting spurs and canes. One of the best to enjoy right off the cane as they are extremely sweet and can be delicate when warmed in the sun. One of the most delicious snacks in your yard guaranteed!

Heritage Raspberry- 4-5'x 3-4' Harvest raspberries your first year. This variety produces abundant crops of large, sweet, dark red berries that are perfect for eating fresh, canning, freezing, or making jams and jellies. Self-supporting, upright canes are hearty enough to grow in poor soil, but requires a well-drained site. Cold-hardy. Fall-bearing (everbearing) primocane with a summer crop. Floricane berries ripen in July. Primocane berries ripen in September through frost. Self-pollinating.

Everbearing Strawberry- Everbearing strawberry plants begin to form flower buds when day length is 12 hours or more per day. True everbearing strawberry plants produce two to three separate yields of strawberries, one crop in spring to early summer, another crop in midsummer in cooler climates, and the last crop in late summer to early fall.
